3rd July, 2020

You'll have heard that large parts of our economy are set to reopen on 'Super Saturday', 4th July. It particularly impacts the hospitality, accommodation, leisure and personal care sectors.

There will be fewer restrictions on the public too.

The Government has been issuing new guidelines in preparation for these significant changes. This briefing will feature the key points, signpost links and highlight ways to keep both businesses and residents safe.

Please remember that despite these new freedoms, the risks are still present. Just this week we've seen the first city to have a local lockdown imposed (Leicester), due to the number of confirmed cases on the rise. Some 36 areas across England are experiencing a fresh surge according to Public Health England (PHE).

As we ease out of lockdown, the message to our communities is please be considerate to others, and help us all stay safe.

Mendip District Council (MDC) lifts restrictions on its play areas this weekend

All 45 **MDC-owned** play spaces, kick-about areas and skate parks will be accessible again from 4th July. In readiness for the reopening, MDC have been undertaking equipment replacement and maintenance at a number of locations, alongside safety checks across all sites. Outdoor play areas were shut in March due to the coronavirus pandemic to help prevent the spread of the disease.

The British Beer & Pub Association urged people to support landlords as they open their doors for the first time in months. What you can and can't do

The Government has set out its plan to return life to as near normal as possible, for as many people as possible, quickly and fairly, in order to safeguard livelihoods, but in a way that continues to protect our communities and the NHS.

The latest changes to the lockdown restrictions are due to come in to effect this weekend. To help understand these new changes, the Government has published FAQs on [what you can and cannot do](#) after 4th July.

Please be considerate to others. When out, keep two meters apart. Walk or cycle where you can, and take your rubbish away or place in a bin when you leave so others have a clean space to enjoy.

If driving, park considerately - remember all Council-owned car parks in Mendip are free to use.

What businesses are reopening?

From 4th July, many businesses and venues will be permitted to reopen and will be expected to follow COVID-19 Secure guidelines. These include:

- hotels, hostels, bed and breakfast accommodation, holiday apartments or homes, cottages or bungalows, campsites, caravan parks or boarding houses
- places of worship
- libraries, community centres and social clubs
- restaurants, cafes, workplace canteens, bars, pubs that are self-contained and can be accessed from the outside
- hair salons and barbers, including mobile businesses
- cinemas, theatres and concert halls
- funfairs, theme parks, model villages, adventure parks and activities
- outdoor gyms and playgrounds, and outdoor skating rinks
- museums and galleries
- bingo halls, amusement arcades and other entertainment centres
- indoor attractions at aquariums, zoos, safari parks, farms, wildlife centres and any place where animals are exhibited to the public as an attraction
- indoor and outdoor areas of visitor attractions including, gardens, heritage sites, film studios and landmarks

What will need to remain closed by law?

The following businesses will need to remain closed, as it's been assessed they cannot yet be made sufficiently COVID-19 secure:

- nightclubs and casinos
- bowling alleys, indoor skating rinks, indoor play areas including soft-play
- spas, nail bars, beauty salons and tanning salons, massage, tattoo and piercing parlours
- indoor fitness and dance studios, and indoor gyms and sports venues/facilities
- swimming pools and water parks
- exhibition or conference centres - where they are to be used for exhibitions or conferences, other than for those who work for that venue

Your new-look high streets

If you are heading out for the first time since lockdown, please be aware that your high streets will feel a little different. There may be pedestrianisation schemes, new traffic flow systems in place - and look out for those pop-up cycle lanes and cyclists too.

Mendip	Frome	Frome Town Council providing access only to the Market Place to enable Market Place improvement works with car parks remaining open
Mendip	Street	Temporarily pedestrianise (with delivery vehicle access only) High Street from Leigh Road to Vestry Road (where market normally takes place).
Mendip	Wells	Pedestrianisation of Market Place and partial closure of High Street between Queens Street and Broad Street junction.
Mendip	Glastonbury	Temporarily pedestrianise (with delivery and bus access only) High Street, Magdalene Street and Benedict Street
Mendip	Shepton Mallet	No changes to highways requested – to be reviewed
Mendip	Wells to Glastonbury lane	Temporary closure (with residential / farm access only) of Long Drove following existing cycle route to facilitate safer cycling between the towns and support social distancing on public transport (Glastonbury – Wells bus service).

Travelling safely

You can help control coronavirus and travel safely by:

- working from home where possible
- shopping locally and less often
- considering all other forms of transport, such as cycling and walking, before using public transport
- avoiding the busiest times and routes
- keeping your distance when your travel, where possible
- washing or sanitising your hands regularly

You should not travel at all if you:

- are experiencing any **coronavirus symptoms**
- are **self-isolating as a result of coronavirus symptoms or sharing a household or support bubble with somebody with symptoms**
- are **clinically extremely vulnerable** and cannot shield during your journey
- have been advised by the **NHS test and trace service** that you should self-isolate

If you have any symptoms of coronavirus you should self-isolate at home and **arrange to have a test to see if you have coronavirus**. If anyone in your household or **support bubble** has symptoms of coronavirus you should self-isolate.

Public transport: The Government has published updated **safer transport guidance for operators**. This now reflects that, from 4th July, transport operators' risk assessments are expected, where possible, to enable social distancing of two metres or one metre with risk mitigations (where two metres is not viable).

Safe use of council buildings

There is guidance for those managing council buildings. The guidance applies to all users of council buildings including visitors attending meetings or council buildings, and councillors working from council buildings.

Support for pubs, restaurants and cafes

The Government has introduced plans to allow more pubs, restaurants and cafes to serve customers outside. It's working on legislation to relax some alcohol and pavement licensing laws too, but these will not be on place until later this month. Meanwhile Mendip Officers have been working with business owners to support them opening safely from 6am on Saturday, 4th July.

Changes to Planning

Under the Town and Country Planning Regulations, councils will not be required to get planning permission to use land for the purpose of holding a market. The right is time-limited and will cease to have effect from **23rd March 2021**.

The regulations will also give people greater freedom over how they use their land by doubling the length of time that temporary structures can be placed on land without needing an application for planning permission.

This will allow land to be used for a broad range of purposes such as for car boot sales and summer fayres, as well as allowing pubs and restaurants to be able to use car parks and terraces as dining and drinking areas, using their existing seating licenses. The right is time-limited and will cease to have effect from 1 January 2021.

Councils are asked to continue to ensure their communities are consulted on licensing applications, that waste is disposed of responsibly, and that access to pavements and pedestrianised areas is not compromised.
